Annual General Meeting July 2013

The Baysiders have finished 2012/13 with another active although mixed year.

On the Social side we had a great opening season barbecue at Andrew & Amanda's home, a successful Christmas Party, a New Year's Day lunch at the Gippsland Lakes and a Mid Winter Get-Away based at Clive and Sue's home at Avenel.

We have cruised our hearts out at the Gippsland Lakes, but disappointingly cruises closer to Melbourne have not been well attended, if at all. I have noticed a strong trend in recent years towards participation in Gippsland Lakes cruises but little interest in anything else.

Also disappointingly I report that Baysider membership has remained static or fallen slightly this year. Financially we have money in the bank and can continue to operate into next year.

The Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 was passed in November last year and we have been addressing changes that we must make to our constitution. More on this later.

Earlier this year we held our "Baysiders Cafe" where we sat around, cafe style, over a cup of coffee and tossed over a whole lot of ideas as to the running of our club. More on this later too.

CHECK THOSE TRAILER WHEEL BEARINGS

I have just spent this morning checking and replacing all the wheel bearings on my trailer. This is a job that should be done at least once a year and certainly before any long trip. I thought I'd pass on a little bit of this experience. When you have a failed wheel bearing on the way down to the Gippsland Lakes in the rain in the middle of the night, I hope this might help.

For those of you that regard this as a bit of a mystery – read on. Many of you know exactly what to do – stop reading now.

First of all, some stuff that will come in handy:

- Jack & jack blocks
- Hammer or mallet to knock bearing buddies off & other stuff later
- Big shifter to undo the retaining nut on the end of the axle
- Side cutters & pliers to get the split pin out. And a new one in.
- Socket set to get the brake callipers off
- String to hold the callipers up so that the brake line does not fall & crack
- A tarp to sit on because it is bound to be wet.
- Multiple rags to clean up grease (Bunnings approx. \$5 per 1.5kg pack)
- Petrol to clean hands, bearings etc from the boat.
- Gal bucket for petrol
- Big punch to punch out existing bearing races
- Two short pieces of 3 by 2 to rest the hub on when punching out the old races
- · Replacement bearings
- · Replacement split pins
- Wheel bearing grease
- Grease gun
- Torch/fluoro light etc you will almost certainly be doing this in the dark.

My step by step procedure is as follows:

- Go out and get yourself a decent hydraulic jack. Don't rely on the old car jack. And make sure you have some blocks for putting under the chassis once it is jacked up. It's no different to jacking up the vehicle. Safety first!
- 2. I also carry a complete hub and brake disk with bearing races already inserted and ready to go. Also the new bearings to go in them.
- 3. Take the wheel off and knock off the bearing buddy (or the cap if sealed).
- 4. Tie a cord around the brake calliper to prevent it from falling when it is unbolted. Falling could crack the hydraulic line. If you have cable brakes, forget it.

- 5. Unbolt the brake callipers from behind. You will need a socket wrench to get at these. Keep track of which bolt is which as it is likely that one of the bolts is larger than the other.
- 6. Extract the split pin with pliers and if you don't have new split pins, keep in a safe place to reuse. Remove the big washer and unscrew the retaining nut.
- Remove the front bearing. Lift the hub off the axle.
 The rubber seal at the back is likely to remain on the
- 8. Using the punch, give a few light taps right through the hub to knock the backing plate out. This is holding the rear bearing in.
- 9. There will be masses of old grease. Use petrol soaked rags to clean this out.
- 10. Rest the hub on the two pieces of 3 by 2. Use the punch and a good heavy mash hammer to belt out the old races. Both sides. They are a very tight fit, but they come eventually.
- 11. Clean out the hub with a petrol soaked rag.
- 12. Insert the new races, one at a time. Make sure that they face the right way, ready to receive the bearings. Bash them in, using the punch and the mash hammer until they are seated perfectly. There is a special tool for doing this, but it seems to be very hard to find. I have not been able to get one.
- 13. Get the wheel bearings ready. Put a big glob of grease in the palm of your hand. Take the wheel bearings and force the grease into the bearing by squeezing it across your hand. Don't under-do this bit.
- 14. Put a liberal amount of grease into the hub & around the race where the rear bearing will go. Insert the bearing.
- 15. Tap the backing plate in, or alternatively, the new rubber seal with an internal spring which takes the place of the backing plate. If you have this, then remove the old rubber seal from the back of the axle. If you have the new rubber seal type, tap it in with the hammer until it is flush with the hub. Wipe any grease away from the rubber.
- 16. Carefully fit the hub with the new rear bearing onto the axle.
- 17. Pack more grease into the hole at the front and then fit the new bearing.
- 18. Insert the big washer and then the retaining nut. Tighten the nut with the shifting spanner several times. Tighten then back off. Tighten then back off. Un-tighten enough so that the new split pin can go through the hole in the axle. Using the side cutters, bend the long side of the split pin outwards and right up to the centre of the axle. Using the side cutters again, cut off any excess on the other side of the split pin (leave about 5mm).
- 19. Re-bolt the brake callipers, ensuring that the brake pads are seated correctly. Undo and keep the cord that supported the callipers.

- 20. Check the rotation of the hub. It is likely to be "stiffish" but not too stiff. You may hear a sort of scraping sound. This will be the brake pads on the rotor and is normal.
- 21. Knock the bearing buddies back in with a mallet or block of wood.
- 22. Use the grease gun to get some grease into the bearing buddies.
- 23. Replace the wheel.
- 24. Pack all the stuff away, ready for next time.

Of course, you would use this same procedure to give the wheel bearings their annual check, and certainly before a big trip. If there is any sign of burning of the bearings at all, throw them out and replace them. And don't just get the cheap Chinese bearings from the discount auto places. These are not hardened sufficiently. Use quality bearings such as SKF, particularly for the larger boats where the bearings are carrying quite a load.

So if you are halfway down to the Gippsland Lakes on a Friday night and the rain is pouring down, you can now confidently tackle this knowing that you will be back on the road in about 30 minutes!!

What you need:
1 fairly ripe Avocado
2 tablespoons of Sweet Chilli Sauce
2 dessertspoons of pine nuts
Squeeze of lemon
Sprinkle of olive oil

Lightly brown the pine nuts in a shallow pan. Remove and cool and then crush with a fork. Remove the contents of the avocado onto a mixing board and then add the pine nuts and sweet chilli sauce. Add the lemon (optional) and mix well

Cruise Plan: This is a cruise for music lovers who also happen to be sailors.

This cruise requires a casual berth at the Queenscliff Marina. The last contact with Marina staff confirmed that some berths may still be available but they cannot give a definite commitment. If you have already booked a berth, consider joining the cruise. If you haven't booked a berth, contact the Marina quickly, but you may not know if you have a berth until a week or so before. The cruise plan is to launch at Martha Cove on Friday November 22 and sail across the southern end of the Bay to enter Queenscliff boat harbour in the mid afternoon. Probable lunch stop at Popes Eye. Plan to enter the harbour at around 5 pm which should be slackwater at high tide. Saturday and Sunday will be non sailing days (unless the music is extremely disappointing). Monday will see a return back to Martha Cove, again following a route along the southern side of the bay and the south side of mud island.

BAYSIDERS CAFE QUESTIONS & RESULTS

Following the General Meeting held at the Mordialloc Sailing Club in March, we held a "Baysiders Cafe". The concept was that we all sat around a big table café style and discussed the big issues of the club over a cup of coffee & cakes.

Here are the main questions and responses. Note that because of the small number of members involved at the meeting and the zero members who responded to the email invitation to comment, these views are indicative rather than representative.

The overall question is: "What do we do well and what could be changed or done better?"

1. Meetings (General)

• What is good about Baysider general meetings?

Social interaction, but we could explore a change of venue? Say a meeting at a picnic lunch.

 Are there too many or is the number about right (4 per year – approx. quarterly)?

Quarterly Ok, but only if we can attract greater numbers. Otherwise cut back if members not interested.

 Are meeting venues right (currently Mordialloc Sailing Club & sometimes at social functions)?

General meetings tied in with social functions preferred. Meetings at members' homes are good.

Is general meeting content right? Could it be different?
 Should it be shorter?

Meetings could be held prior to briefing for a cruise or just before happy hour.

• Is it good to have a meal first? Not necessary.

2. Social functions

What is good about our Baysider social functions?

They are fun, being together, game playing and walking activities to be encouraged. Happy hour.

Are there enough? Are there too many?

Fine the way it is. Spit roasts and sausage sizzles on the bank are enjoyed. Good to have functions at members' homes.

Are functions too expensive? Are we too cheap?

Meal prices to be comparable to that of an average hotel meal.

Prefer to charge say, \$30 per head and let others do the work.

In the first 20 years of the club members prepared and hosted events privately, with simple outlay at minimum cost. Members needs have changed and our events will reflect this.

 Should we mix business with pleasure? (eg, general meeting preceding a function).

Yes. OK to have a general meeting followed by a function.

• Are venues right? Are there alternatives?

Mordialloc Club OK, but prefer something at members' homes.

 Do members like a New Years Day lunch or would they prefer to be sailing?

Lunch is preferred as it has become a tradition.

3. Christmas Party

 What is good about our Christmas party? What could be done better?

Good fun. Presentations and awards should be continued. November is a good time for the Christmas party rather than the busy December period.

Very hard to attract numbers now. Could think about something different – say a lunch at a winery

Are the numbers right? Is it OK to invite friends?
 Invitations to go to members with a RSVP cut off date, then

friends can be invited
Do people like to have a themed party?
Yes, all approved.

 Are there alternatives? Should we go to a commercial venue & just pay for dinner/lunch?

Yes, we should think about a venue where we just pay individually. A yacht club or a winery. Hastings Yacht Club was great last year but very hard work.

 Is evening OK? Would lunch at a central location attract more people?

Evening preferred, but agree a change to lunch time might attract more members.

4. Training

• Do we do this well? Could we do more (or less)?

Could consider additional courses.

- a. Radio
- b. Man overboard,
- c. Ladies days with Joan

Each boat is encouraged to have a laminated sheet showing radio procedure in point form.

Experienced sailors sail aboard inexperienced boats to help guide technically and geographically.

We could make a DVD on trailable sailing.

Attach BTYC banners to our boats when rigging up or down to advertise.

Every boat is to have BTYC brochures available on request. Every boat is to fly a BTYC burgee when attending a cruise. We could hold novice open days to show the public inside our boats, how to rig etc.

The website is to be updated to describe what and how we sail and why it might be something for others to consider. Members are expected to contribute ideas, images and content.

Promote the idea of 'grandparent' old salt mentoring for children of members.

When should training be carried out? Part of general meeting format?

Yes, simple procedures like rope throwing, knot tying and radio protocols could be demonstrated and practiced.

5. Cruises

What is good about Baysider cruises? What could we do better?

We like the social interaction and particularly the happy hours at the end of the day.

Is the number of cruises right? Are there enough or too many?

Number of cruises is adequate, Gippsland is preferred to Port Phillip.

Are one day or weekend cruises attractive to people?

One day & ordinary weekends are too short. Long weekends preferred, perhaps some could be outside mandated dates.

• Are cruise destinations right?

Most members prefer Gippsland. Westernport is good, but fails to attract many boats.

Should there be more extended cruises?

Still under discussion. But the concept is well accepted.

• Are cruise briefings and information adequate?

Yes, but cruise co-ordinator must be responsible for signing on and signing off members in order to comply with our insurance.

Is safety OK?

Yes. Members are very aware of weather issues & keeping an eye on each other.

The idea of the buddy system appeals with more experienced members sailing along side or aboard an inexperienced boat.

Do new members feel that they are adequately included and looked after? Could this be better?

Positive response from new members Louis & Margaret Belcourt on this.

Do members like to see their cruise numbers & receive cruise pennants for milestones?

Yes, but could develop other categories that pennants might be awarded for ie; boat upkeep, presentation, playful ideas might be fun.

The main prize will be a boat full of carpet supplied by BE.

6. Membership

What is good about being a member of the Baysiders?

Company, non-competitive, friendship, unpretentious, helpful, supportive

We need to develop a set of core values and filter them down into point form which could be part of our brand and be included on business cards.

Are member numbers right? Is the membership profile

Boat numbers have fluctuated over the years from about 80 down to about 40 now. We need to encourage new membership. We are not a young family club, as there is

too much competition for young families to be involved in areas such as water and snow skiing.

Other yacht clubs have teaching programs, we are not equipped to do this, however a grandchild 'nipper' skill development could be considered on an informal level.

- Is the annual membership subscription (\$50) right?
- Are we Family Friendly enough? Are we promoting our family values enough?

Yes

Do we promote and market the club adequately? What could we do better?

Cards for handing out at boat ramps. Big forestay type banners/flags.

Would members buy and wear themed clothing? (eg, caps, polo tops etc)?

Yes, Brian Enno is organising a sample fleece jacket and polo shirt for members' consideration. They will be red as base colour with white embroidery, and order form will be coming out shortly. Jackets approx. \$50 Embroidery \$5 BE has personally paid for artwork. The more units we order the less the price will be.

7. Newsletter and website

What is good about them?

Pictures are great, but should load quicker.

Wives and partners' emails to be included when sending out newsletters.

Lots of information about the club, our plans etc. Should go out when subs are due.

What could be improved?

Sailing tips, boat maintenance tips, Newsletters should include stories, recipes and images.

100-150 word stories about what we love about cruising and anecdotal stories, it's up to the members to contribute. Provide a map of where pump out stations are.

Members could contribute content based on an alphabetical order system, even if it's not directly about sailing, perhaps what's happening in our lives, self-deprecating anecdotal stories are loved by almost everyone.

Expensive to send out in the mail. But might be worth it to get more involvement.

Is the frequency of the newsletter OK?

Yes. About 4 per year.
