## THE WOODEN BOAT FESTIVAL, HOBART February 10 to February 13, 2023

The festival is free and takes place along the beautiful Hobart waterfront, bringing the largest collection of wooden boats together in the southern hemisphere. It began in 1994. BTYC members Joan Rockliff, Geoffrey Peplar, Jim Reynolds and Cathy Reynolds all lucky enough to attend.



With all enveloped in a happy atmosphere, there are boats afloat and ashore, working marine engines, seminars, demonstrations, trade displays, boat building displays, music, brass bands, plays, films and more. Salamanca market added to the fun.

The event opened with the sail past in a light southerly wind of well over a hundred vessels. The tall ships Enterprize, Young Endeavour, Soren Larsen, One and All, James Craig, Duyfken, Lady Nelson, Julie Burgess, Windward Bound and Rhona H made for a wonderful spectacle as they passed the spectators ranged along the shoreline. Duyfken 1660 (replica of the original first recorded European ship to visit Australia) made a loud entrance as she fired off a broadside at the spectators! Of course, all the little ships under sail and motor only added to the spectacle with each vessel in immaculate condition.



Various motor craft were also on display. Especially notable was the 50 years old Denison Star, with her 107 feet long Huon Pine Hull making her very rare. She has seen duty as the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race start boat. Privately owned, she is near completely restored.

Boats ashore included sailing and rowing dinghies, canoes, surfboards, and motorboats, etc. There were only one or two trailer sailers on display, one being a beautiful gaff rigged 22-footer. All the vessels had an elegance and air of history, if they could talk what amazing stories they would tell.

Joan was fortunate to find and go aboard Vittoria, a vessel she had not seen for forty-five years. This yacht with her owner Lou Abrahams had many a race battle against Joan's father Bill Rockliff's yacht Bacardi. Most notably a Sydney to Suva race in 1976, where the two boats went through the start line on opposite tacks. After travelling 2776km's over ten days and never in sight of each other until they entered Kandavu Passage, they raced neck and neck to the finish line with Bacardi 52 seconds ahead of Vittoria!

Full descriptions of all to see at the festival could take up pages but in summary the best part of the event is the dedication and craftsmanship on display and the sense that any ship or little ship does not have an owner but a custodian. Perhaps in February 2025 the club could consider a Baysiders Group to attend. Bring it on!

#### CRUISE REPORT AUSTRALIA DAY CRUISE JANUARY 21 TO JANUARY 26 2023

Mid afternoon on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> January Silk Department and Skyhoot arrived in the Slip Road car park and proceeded to rig up. The easterly which was light when we arrived gradually strengthened until by 5.00pm it was very strong indeed. Rather than try to launch we enjoyed a lovely dinner and a bottle of wine on the foreshore and then spent a comfortable night on board in the car park.

We launched in the morning in fine and very still conditions but before sailing anywhere I had a very important job to do. I drove the trailer down to Riviera Trailers at Bairnsdale for a complete refurbishment. Despite being only 11 years old the five steel cross members which support the central rollers were completely rusted out and needed to be replaced. A job that they would complete while we cruised.

Sunday morning was chilly with a sea mist and no wind. With Spiders Web we motored to Ocean Grange where we met up with John & Joan Coombes in Merlin and Norman & Annette Munns in Sally Anne.

Despite a forecast of 10-15 knots the following morning was fine but with no wind. We motored over to Duck Arm and backed into the beach with Paul and Debbie Howe in Second Wind II joining us. Unfortunately, the Coombes discovered a serious leak in Merlin and decided to motor straight back to Paynesville and take the boat home. I talked to a Magnum owner on the beach and discovered that the owner was Greg Reed (ex Careel 22 "KittyHawk") who I used to race against at Yaringa 15-20 years ago. He has now joined the Baysiders.

Finally, a lovely sail. A nice easterly of 10-15 knots took us all the way to Nicholson which we had mostly to ourselves and then next morning a fine chilly and windless morning saw us motor all the way to Metung. Anne and I had our traditional January lunch sitting in the cockpit with a bottle of champagne and oysters and prawns from the "Farmer and Cook". No happy hour today. Too cold and too windy!

Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> of January. Australia Day. Still tied up at Metung. I flew my big Australian Flag from the masthead.

We sailed back to Ocean Grange in a very light south westerly with Skyhoot and Spiders Web leaving us to go home. Happy hour in the picnic ground was interesting where we were joined by John and Margaret Bennet from Magnum "Top Gun" and Richard and Dorothy Bennet from the French boat.

Friday we returned to a very busy Paynesville and a strong easterly setting in. From the end jetty at the GLYC we watched Joan and Geoffrey in Take it Easy start the club race, looking very smart in all new sails (including a reefed main). A couple of hours later we watched them cross the finish line a creditable second place. Saturday was fine but cloudy with very little wind and a forecast of 33deg. We set off with Wanton, Eclipse, and Crème Caramel to sail around Raymond Island. They headed to Steamer Landing while we motored to Duck Arm for the afternoon. I counted about a dozen big cruisers and a couple of yachts at anchor in the bay inside Duck Arm. Ideal conditions on this very hot day on the long weekend. Anne had a swim and then we motored back to Paynesville. I picked up my boat trailer from Riviera Trailers (very impressed with the work they did) and at 1700 retrieved the boat and derigged.

# Notice of Cruise The Frostbite Cruise

Gíppsland Lakes, May 15 to May 19, 2023

Register with Joan Rockliff and Geoff Peplar, (text by preference) for the 2023 Frostbite Cruise. The cruise destinations will be determined daily with boats based in Paynesville. Crews can seek to stay in land based accommodation or on board with suitable clothing. There will be a formal briefing each day at a time and place to be nominated by Joan and Geoff, whereby we will go to picnic lunch destinations or café/hotel destinations where we normally don't go due to sea breezes in the summer.

Please Note: The following are the individual responsibilities of each skipper:

- If you register for the cruise and are unable to attend, advise the cruise coordinator.
- Each skipper should make radio contact with the cruise coordinator at the start of the cruise.
- Carry adequate navigational charts for the area in which the cruise is being conducted.
- Ensure that the vessel is fully compliant with Marine Safety Regulations
- Advise the cruise coordinator when you are leaving the cruise, particularly if leaving early.
- It is always the Master of the Vessel's decision alone as to whether to cruise or to discontinue and retire from a cruise.

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
