In days of old (1975) when a young man named Mudbank was a sailing novice, he joined Hastings Yacht Club (HYC) hoping to crew on a fine yacht. One HYC skipper, perhaps desperate for crew quickly offered Mudbank a position as foredeck hand on a newly arrived small keelboat.

COVID 19 REGULATIONS and SAILING WITH BTYC in 2021/22

It seems that the only thing you can really rely upon in an epidemic is that next week there will be a change. Regulations and guidelines are in constant flux. The rules around birthdays, weddings, travel, funerals and Xmas vary from week to week and from state to state. In the midst of all this, your committee has tried to run sailing and social events, many of which have been deferred or cancelled, sometimes only to find that we could have run it after all.

Your committee has determined that participation in club events for the time being will require all participants to be double vaccinated. Sailing is an outdoor activity, and Yachting Victoria have provided some guidelines for us as to how Covid 19 regulations should be implemented in an outdoor setting. We are a very social club, and our activities are not isolated away from one another once each day's sail is completed. The BTYC committee have assessed risk and have decided that our club has a responsibility to our membership to minimize potential exposure to Covid 19. As such the committee has adopted a policy whereby club members need to establish their double vaccination status prior to participating in any future club activity.

Our membership officer, Gaye Pitt will be the registrar for the purpose of confirming your vaccination status. There are three ways you can do this:

- Contact Gaye by telephone on 0408 266325. Show her a copy of your proof of vaccination. Using Facetime could be a good option because you can then show a copy of the record over the phone. She doesn't want to keep records of the vaccination certificate, just needs to sight it and confirm your status.
- Forward an email to Gaye with your vaccination details attached. There are privacy concerns with the data on some documents, and you may like to redact some information such as date of birth and Medibank number. No records are kept. The email address to use is thepitts@dcsi.net.au
- 3. Show some proof of vaccination to the cruise coordinator or function organiser of the next BTYC event that you attend. Make sure they write down that you are confirmed so that this can be passed on to Gaye.

Please keep a watch out for more information on this topic. Any change of BTYC policy will be from the Commodore via email with confirmation down the track in the newsletter. It is likely, no, it is certain that the requirements will change with time as the epidemic progresses and hopefully wanes. But nothing is certain.

CHANGES TO BOATING REGULATIONS IN BANCROFT BAY

Earlier this year Gippsland Ports undertook a user survey of the boating fraternity who regularly visit or travel through Bancroft Bay on the east side of Metung. The survey was conducted on-line and several BTYC members participated in the survey. As a consequence of the survey and also upon discussions with commercial and non commercial user groups, Gippsland ports have made changes to the boating regulations that now apply within Bancroft Bay.

Many of the survey responses indicated that their major concern is large displacement vessels travelling at speeds that generate an unacceptably large wake. But many respondents also expressed concern that a blanket 5 knot speed limit would be unreasonable and disadvantage the many recreational boating users of the bay.

Gippsland Ports has arrived at a preferred option, which is to seek approval from Marine Safety Victoria for a 5 knot restriction to apply to vessels greater than 8 metres in length, from Shaving Point to Bell Point. Vessels under sail will be exempt from the restriction. The existing 5 knot zones parallel to the shores will remain for all vessels.

A map of the proposed new arrangements can be found below.

Gippsland Ports has arrived at this position after considering input via the survey and the views of Gippsland Water Police. They regard this as the most practical option for managing the risk without unreasonably restricting recreational boating activity. If Marine Safety Victoria approval is granted, new buoyage and signage will be provided to notify vessel operators. A common-sense approach to enforcement will be applied while vessel operators adjust to the restrictions.

Gippsland Ports will now seek the approval of Marine Safety Victoria to implement the change.
